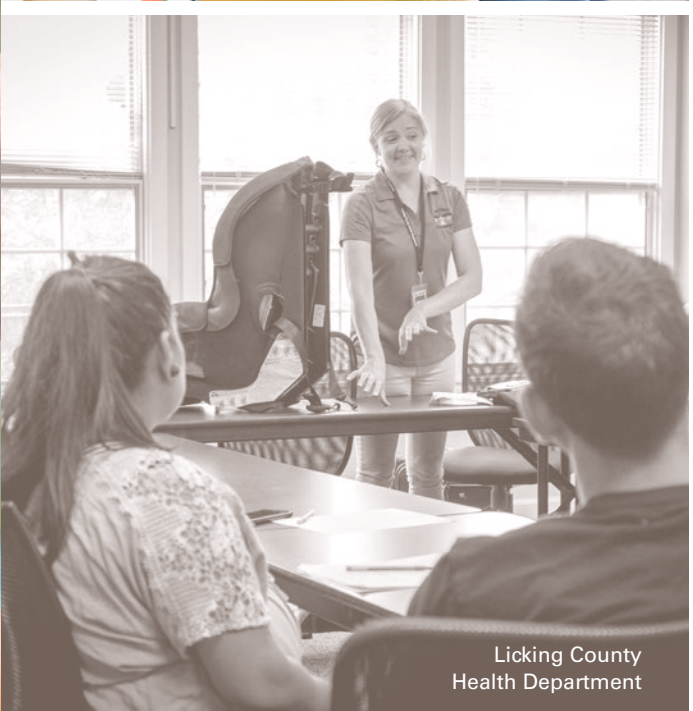

People, places and organizations “lightening the burdens” of others set Licking County apart and continue to make it our wonderful home. Thank you for making 2017 another inspiring year for the Licking County Foundation. It was marked with some remarkable achievements and notable milestones reached.

We welcomed 16 new funds, all created by caring donors to help people throughout our community live happy, healthy and hopeful lives:

- From fostering the entrepreneurial spirit of business students to nurturing the creative spirit of young dancers; from promoting leadership and building capacity in the Johnstown area to providing respite for Licking County families with seriously ill children; and from pursuing the philanthropic goals of Newark-Heath Rotary and the Young Leaders of Licking County to fulfilling the philanthropic goals of the individuals and families who are now donor advisors.

We awarded over 600 grants and scholarships to nonprofits and students across the county to meet the ever-changing needs of our community by responding to new programs, emerging needs, innovative services and advancing opportunities:

- From making local food sustainable for local farmers and businesses to granting the wishes of children in foster care; from revitalizing low income neighborhoods to engaging over 1,000 volunteers to give homeless pets a new leash on life; from strengthening the vital services of emergency shelters for homeless men, women and children to advocacy for children who witness domestic violence or experience barriers to success in school; and from improving Pataskala’s LEADS Park to creating the Village of Hanover’s new Legacy Park for bringing together folks of all ages and abilities.
- From supporting successful lives through the pursuit of a wide range of careers like tourism, agriculture, engineering, education, medicine, building and manufacturing skilled trades, business, mathematics, acting, music, horticulture, history and culinary arts to sponsoring events county-wide which bring diverse groups together to participate for the greater good and also have some fun.

This is just a sample! As you can see, countless lives across our county were changed for the better. Through your compassion, we impacted people from Pataskala to Hanover, from Kirkersville to Utica, from Croton to Granville, from Johnstown to Heath and everywhere in between.

To cap an already remarkable year, we celebrated our endowment topping \$100,000,000. Thanks to generations of generosity, this endowment ensures charitable support that our community can count on year-in and year-out.

## Patricia O’Brien Armstrong Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established by Patricia O’Brien Armstrong. This renewable scholarship assists female Newark High School graduating seniors who are first generation college students pursuing careers in a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) related field at an accredited four-year college or university.

## Baker, Chilcote and Jones Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established through a bequest from Mary E. Chilcote to support college education. Mary E. Chilcote was born May 29, 1920 in Newark, Ohio. Miss Chilcote attended Wilson College in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania and graduated from The Ohio State University with a BA in English. She moved to Cleveland in 1946 to attend Western Reserve University where she received a master’s degree in English Literature. She worked as a reference librarian at the Cleveland Public Library and eventually served as the head reference librarian at Ernst & Ernst. Education was important to Miss Chilcote, and it served as a gateway to make changes in her life. She was a world traveler, and it was important to her that others had the opportunity to see the world. She also loved classical music, The Cleveland Orchestra and the City of Cleveland.

## Busack Family Fund

A community charitable fund established by Dean and Jessica Busack for the purpose of pursuing their philanthropic goals and benefiting the charitable causes and organizations the Busack Family cares about most.

## Central Ohio Family Theatre’s Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established through the Central Ohio Family Theatre’s constitution to award a scholarship to any high school graduate wishing to further his/her acting career.



## Don Edwards Park/ World Series Fund

A project fund established for the purpose of hosting the Babe Ruth World Series tournament at Don Edwards Park in August 2019 and making improvements to the Park which is owned by The City of Newark and operated by the Licking County Family YMCA.

## A Home for Central Ohio Youth Ballet

A project fund established by the Central Ohio Youth Ballet (COYB) for the purpose of procuring, renovating and maintaining a facility. COYB’s mission is to provide professional-quality performance opportunities to all area dancers and quality performances to central Ohio audiences. Their dancers come from many different studios and communities throughout central Ohio and range in age from 8-18 with adults joining the group for guest appearances and stage productions. While Central Ohio Youth Ballet production values are high, the artistic staff places dancers in roles across a spectrum of ability and experience levels. COYB nurtures dancers at all stages of proficiency, talent and desire. For the last 22 years, the company’s Thanksgiving weekend performances of *The Nutcracker* at the Midland Theatre have become a holiday tradition in central Ohio.

## Granville Business Alliance Entrepreneurial Spirit Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established by the Granville Business Alliance to foster the entrepreneurial spirit and support the pursuit of business-related careers among Granville High School graduating seniors and Denison University students who have a love for the Granville community. The mission of the Granville Business Alliance is to identify, support and retain business talent and to create an entrepreneurial culture within the Granville area. The organization focuses on educational workshops and events, business culture and development of youth engagement programs.

## Explore Licking County Tourism Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established by Explore Licking County to assist Licking County residents who are pursuing degrees in tourism management, hospitality management or a related field through The Ohio State University’s Bachelor of Science in Hospitality Management program. This degree includes, but is not limited to, careers in such professions as accounting, sales, marketing, operations, food and beverage, catering, and guest services through visitor bureaus and convention centers, recreational businesses, tourism development agencies, travel and tourism agencies, casinos, and other people- and service-oriented organizations. Explore Licking County’s mission is to help the community and visitors find their way to a one of a kind Licking County experience.

## Molly C. Ingold Fund

A community charitable fund Molly Ingold established to benefit the organizations she holds most dear, including her church, the Midland Theatre, the United Way of Licking County and the Newark Rotary. She also plans to partner with the Foundation to fund emerging initiatives and opportunities. Molly retired in 2015 as Vice President of Administrative Services with Hospice of Central Ohio after also having served as the Director of Human Resources for Licking Memorial Hospital, Executive Director for the United Way of Licking County and Personnel Director for the City of Newark. She is the recipient of the Licking County Chamber of Commerce 2009 Human Resource Management Excellence Award. She has served as President for the Newark Rotary Club, Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities, United Way of Licking County Board of Directors and the Newark City School Board. Currently, she has leadership roles with First United Methodist Church, the Cecil L. Mauger Trust and serves on the boards of Kendal at Granville, Behavioral Healthcare Partners and the Licking County Foundation.



# New Funds

## Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central Ohio Fund

An agency fund established by the Board of Trustees of the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central Ohio to support the organization's charitable and educational purposes with preference for benefiting Licking County children and their families. The mission of the Ronald McDonald House is to create, find and support programs that directly improve the health and well-being of children. The House provides a home-away-from-home for families of seriously-ill children with a comfortable bed, showers and a warm meal on a daily basis while being steps away from their hospitalized child. The first Ronald McDonald House in Columbus opened on 18th Street in 1982. In 1988, capacity was increased to a total of 28 rooms, along with several other specialty areas that helped make the House a home. Over the next 10 years, the House began to experience an increase in need for services as they began serving more hospital departments; and in July 2008, a new 80-bedroom House was opened. In 2014, they opened a 42-guestroom addition and officially became the largest Ronald McDonald House in the world—complete with 137 guest rooms.

## Shirley A. Johnson Fund

An unrestricted fund established through a bequest from the estate of Shirley A. Johnson to address the community's most urgent needs and emerging opportunities. Shirley was born in Herrick, Illinois and was raised on a farm, along with her four brothers and five sisters. Shirley came to Newark in 1954 to join her brother, who married a Newark native. Shirley loved her career in real estate and helping generations of clients find and sell their homes. She was known for assisting clients personally with making down payments to afford their homes, reducing her commissions and even paying for radon remediation. Putting others before herself, she was a long-time member of the Zonta Club and a Licking Memorial Hospital board member. Shirley was also an active member of the First United Methodist Church. Shirley will be remembered for her generosity, fairness, work ethic, community involvement, sense of humor and dedication to her family.

## Johnstown Area Community Foundation Fund

An agency fund established by the Board of Directors of the Johnstown Area Community Foundation to improve and enhance the quality of life in Johnstown and its surrounding area through strategic philanthropy and community development. The Johnstown Area Community Foundation provides community leadership by promoting collaboration, building community capacity and serving as a catalyst for positive change. Grants from this fund will provide assistance for emerging community needs and special projects. The Board of Directors is composed of volunteer community representatives who want to make a difference in keeping the Johnstown area a great place to call home.

## Rotary Club of Newark-Heath Fund

A donor advised fund established by the Rotary Club of Newark-Heath for the purpose of pursuing the philanthropic goals of its members and benefiting the charitable causes and organizations the Club cares about most. As signified by the Rotary motto "Service Above Self," the Rotary Club of Newark-Heath's main objective is service—in the community, in the workplace and throughout the world. For over 30 years, the Rotary Club of Newark-Heath has provided humanitarian service, encouraged high ethical standards in all vocations and helped build goodwill through its service projects. Each year, the Rotary Club of Newark-Heath distributes approximately 1,200 dictionaries to third graders in the majority of Licking County schools. The Club also provides annual scholarship support to graduating seniors at Heath, Licking Valley, Newark Catholic and C-TEC.

## Young Leaders of Licking County Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund established by Young Leaders of Licking County, an affiliate of the Licking County Chamber of Commerce, which focuses on the development of the county's 21-40 year-old workforce who live or work in Licking County to enhance the workplace, economy and overall quality of life for all residents of Licking County. The organization fosters this next generation of leaders by offering meaningful experiences and opportunities for networking, mentorship, education, philanthropy and leadership development.

## Young Leaders of Licking County Giving Fund

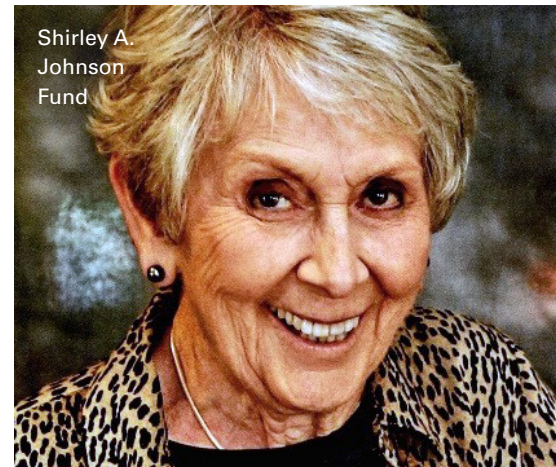

## Richard and Kathy Wenzelberger Fund

A designated agency fund established through a bequest from the estate of Richard P. Wenzelberger to provide continuous, permanent support to the Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities Endowment Fund, the Center for Disability Services Endowment Fund and the Selma Markowitz Fund. Richard and Kathy met in 1970, while both were serving in the U.S. Army and stationed in Vietnam. They were married on December 5, 1970 at the Christ United Methodist Church in Newcomerstown, Ohio. Their son, David, was born in 1974. In 1980, the family moved to Maryland after Richard accepted a civilian position with the Department of Defense. They moved to Newark, Ohio in 2006 to be closer to family. Richard was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He was a U.S. Army veteran of the Vietnam War who served from June 1968 until July 1980. He retired from the National Security Administration in 2006. Kathy was born in Coshocton, Ohio. She graduated from Newcomerstown High, and was a U.S. Army veteran of the Vietnam War who served from January 1970 to September 1970. She volunteered to serve in Vietnam as a tribute to a family friend who had been killed in action. She was also a housewife. Richard died in 2016 and Kathy died in 2008. Both were honored with military services conducted by the Newcomerstown Veterans Honor Guard.

## Young Leaders of Licking County *Impact Story*

*Philanthropy was identified as a key pillar from the very start for the Young Leaders of Licking County (YLLC). Dedicated to engaging young professionals within the Licking County community and making a difference, the group established the Young Leaders of Licking County Giving Fund for pursuing the group's philanthropic goals and benefitting charitable causes and organizations the members care about most. A fourteen-member Philanthropy Committee created a community-wide competitive grant program to award grants to Licking County organizations serving diverse needs. This committee also oversees strategic grantmaking, with a special emphasis on supporting youth. The YLLC has also hosted creative and fun events to grow their charitable fund, including its successful, inaugural Duck Derby fundraiser at the Heath Municipal Pool in 2017.*

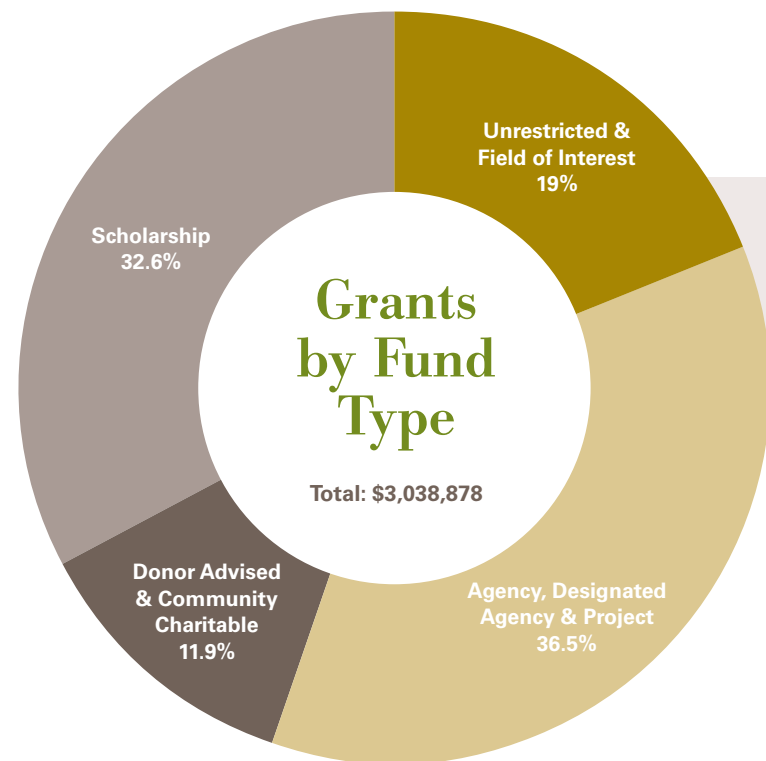

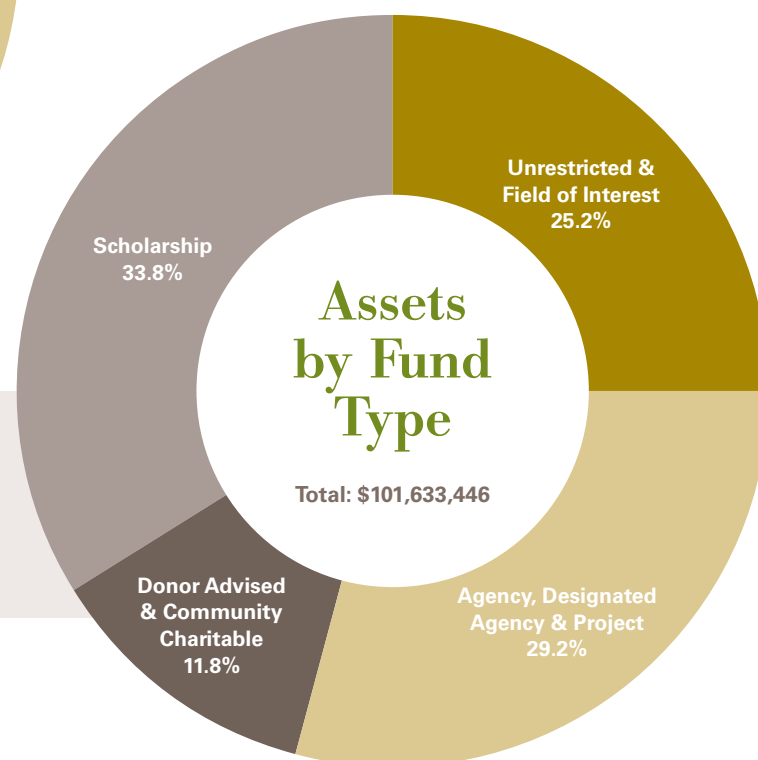


# Grants to the community

The Foundation's grants help area nonprofits meet the ever-changing needs of our community: to respond to new programs, emerging needs and innovative services. Our nonprofit grant partners make it possible for the Foundation to support a wide variety of activities benefiting local citizens of all ages (from infants to seniors) in the areas of arts and culture; education; health and human services; parks and recreation; the environment; economic development and more.



Competitive and strategic grants are awarded from discretionary funds (unrestricted and field of interest) and scholarship funds. Non-competitive grants are awarded from agency, designated agency, donor advised and community charitable funds.



Licking County Foundation's caring donors have built an impressive endowment of \$101.6 million to support important community causes, directing more than \$3.0 million in 2017 to where it's needed most in grants and scholarships.

## Community & Strategic Grants

Licking County's many capable and committed nonprofits contribute greatly to making this area such a tremendous place in which to live and work. Awarded annually through unrestricted and field of interest funds, these grants help nonprofits meet the ever-changing needs of our community.

**Canal Market District and Enterprise Hub:** \$25,000 to support the creation of the Canal Enterprise Hub for making local food sustainable for local farmers, businesses and the community.

**Catholic Social Services:** \$10,000 to support the Supportive Services Program in Licking County, which provides intensive case management services to assist older adults to maintain their highest level of functioning while living independently in the community.

**Center for the Visually Impaired:** \$30,000 to support the Non-Senior Eye Care Services Program, which provides the full spectrum of professional eye care services including glasses on an ongoing basis for the life and eligibility of the client.

**Central Ohio Youth Ballet:** \$2,772 to support the purchase of ballet-quality Marley flooring for *The Nutcracker* performance at the Midland Theatre, the spring Bravo performances which take place throughout Licking County and surrounding areas, as well as the Community OUTREACH Program.

**City of Newark:** \$10,350 to support recreational upgrades at Reddington Road Park, located in west Newark between Reddington Road and Cherry Valley Road. Upgrades include new swing sets, an ADA drinking fountain, ADA picnic tables, benches, trash receptacles and an ADA accessible walkway from the large parking lot to the shelter house.

**City of Newark/Division of Police:** \$1,585 to support ALICE Training.

**The Columbus Foundation:** \$10,000 to support The Big Give Bonus Pool.

**Denison University Studio Art Department:** \$6,000 to support the Billboard Project, aimed at engaging with the Newark and larger community to place art in non-traditional locations; namely by using 12 existing billboards for contemporary art.

**Fostering Further:** \$3,500 to support granting wishes and providing funds for extra-curricular, educational and therapeutic expenses for children in foster care in central Ohio. This funding will also support expanding this service to include kids in local kinship care (those children who are cared for by a relative or friend of the family).

This year, Seth sold his first apples to the Enterprise Hub in November and is looking forward to working more closely with the project in 2018.*

# Grants



**Habitat for Humanity MidOhio:** \$15,000 to support the Homeowner Repair Program in Licking County to stabilize and revitalize low income neighborhoods by helping low income homeowners who are affected by age, disability or family circumstances and are struggling to maintain the integrity of their homes.

**Johnstown United Methodist Church:** \$20,000 to support the Rockin’ Cool Freedom School, a six-week summer enrichment program that helps children fall in love with reading, increases their self-esteem and generates more positive attitudes toward learning.

**Kier Fund Checkbook:** \$25,000 to Licking County Board of Developmental Disabilities to support the unmet needs of developmentally disabled children in Licking County.

**Licking County Aging Program:** \$21,378 to support the Hearing Fund, a program to help low income Licking County senior citizens over the age of 60 obtain hearing enhancement equipment, repairs and replacements.

*“Shortly after one of our low income seniors in her later years received a pair of hearing aids, she called me and was crying on the phone. She said for the first time in so many years she can hear the tires of her car crunching on the stones in the driveway and hear her footsteps as she walked across a room, she was simply overjoyed to hear sounds and noises that were absent from her life for many, many years.”*

**Licking County Arts:** \$1,750 to support the engagement of professional expertise in strategic development areas.

**Licking County Coalition for Housing:** \$25,740 to support Licking County Coordinated Access, which will establish a single point of entry for people and families in Licking County who are homeless or in financial crisis who need quick access to services and support.

**Licking County Community Health Clinic:** \$5,000 to support work in public health priority areas, including tobacco usage, the rate of obesity, access to health care, and reducing chronic and communicable diseases.

**Licking County Family YMCA:** \$25,000 to support All for One Camp programs, designed specifically to serve the organization’s focus areas of Youth Development, Healthy Living and Social Responsibility.

*“The All for One camp allows Tim to participate in outdoor and special activities, and to swim every day with his peers. These are opportunities that we, his grandparent guardians, would not be able to provide. **Licking County Health Department:** \$25,000 to support combined Infant and Childhood Wellness Programming and benefit the health of Licking County’s children through the Newborn Home Visitation Program (NHVP), the Child Passenger Safety program (CPS) and the School-Based Dental Sealant program.

**Licking County Humane Society:** \$8,000 to support the continuance of the Volunteer & Event Coordinator position to engage the over 1,000 volunteers in the organization’s online database and turn them into active participants.



**Licking County Players:** \$5,563 to improve the exterior conditions at the playhouse and make the parking lot safer for patrons.

**Licking/Knox Goodwill Industries, Inc.:** \$10,000 to support the GoodGuides Youth Mentoring Program, which currently provides services in Wilson Middle School, Heritage Middle School, Newark High School and Newark Digital Academy.

**Mental Health America of Licking County:** \$75,000 to support general operating funds to enable the agency to fluidly assist each program based on need.

**Miller Fund Checkbook:** \$1,500 to Licking County Educational Service Center, Licking County Health Department, Licking County Job & Family Services and Newark City Schools to support the unmet medical, dental, mental and behavioral health needs of underserved children in Licking County.

**Newark-Granville Symphony Orchestra:** \$10,000 to support the Educational Outreach program for bringing classical music and music education to students, teachers and community members.

**Newark Midland Theatre Association:** \$27,000 to support the Arts for All: Yellow Bus and Human Services program, a compilation of arts and cultural events that engage young people and families, including individuals who are striving to improve their life situations.

**Ohio State Legal Services Association (Southeastern Ohio Legal Services/Newark Office):** \$25,000 to support the Children’s Legal Assistance Project for providing legal help to families of children (ages 3 to 18), including children with learning and other disabilities that may have been a barrier to their success in school and that may have put them at risk of being placed in the juvenile justice system.

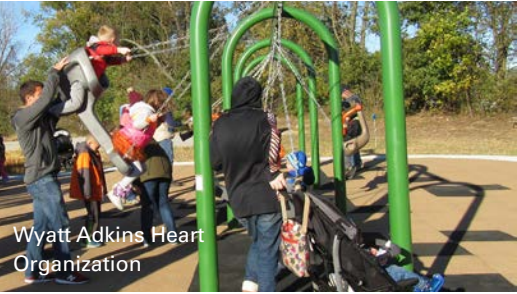

# Leaders for Learning

## Award and Grant Program

Some of the community's very best educators were recognized for inspiring future generations of citizens with the Licking County Foundation's annual Leaders for Learning Award. Area teachers were surprised in their classrooms by representatives of the Licking County Foundation who presented them with an art-glass apple symbolizing the knowledge and inspiration they impart to their students and the community's appreciation for their efforts. Since 1993, more than 300 teachers have been honored for their excellence in teaching.



## Leaders for Learning Grants

Leaders for Learning Award recipients can apply for grants up to \$500 to further their professional development or purchase materials/experiences for their classrooms. This funding support helped: host a family art night, make barn quilts, read *Life* by Cynthia Rylant, turn everyday objects into computer touch pads, add flexible seating to meet students' needs, prepare a school newspaper, extend the use of a greenhouse/garden area and much more!

The awards and 36 grants totaling \$17,623 were made possible through generous support by the Lindorf-Warner Memorial Fund.

The grant award from the LCF allowed me to purchase 13 dorm room style bean bag chairs for my room. The response has been overwhelming. School board members and administrators have visited my room. Even parents have approved and asked to see the way the room is set up! Other teachers are considering ways to bring this kind of varied seating into their rooms. On the first day I unveiled them, I remember one senior boy coming in and looking at me and saying, "Wow. Someone finally listened." Though it might seem like bean bag chairs are just a "nice idea," the difference in my students' attitudes about their work and their learning community in this room is amazing. A few of them wrote some messages about the chairs, now that they've been in them for a few weeks. Here are some excerpts:

*"This is how I write at home."*

*"I feel really relaxed in here. My ideas don't flow when I'm in a hard desk for some reason."*

*"It's so nice to actually be comfortable one period of the day. I don't want to leave here."*

Since 1996, this award has honored individuals whose integrity and compassion sometimes go unnoticed—those who might be called the “unsung heroes” of their communities.

He is also a past President of the Licking County Bar Association. In addition to these organizations, Bill is extremely involved in the community. He is the Treasurer of both A Call To College and The LeFevre Foundation. He also serves on the Executive and Finance Committees of The Works: Ohio Center for History, Art & Technology. Bill lent his time and talent to levy campaigns for Newark City Schools from 1994 to 2014.

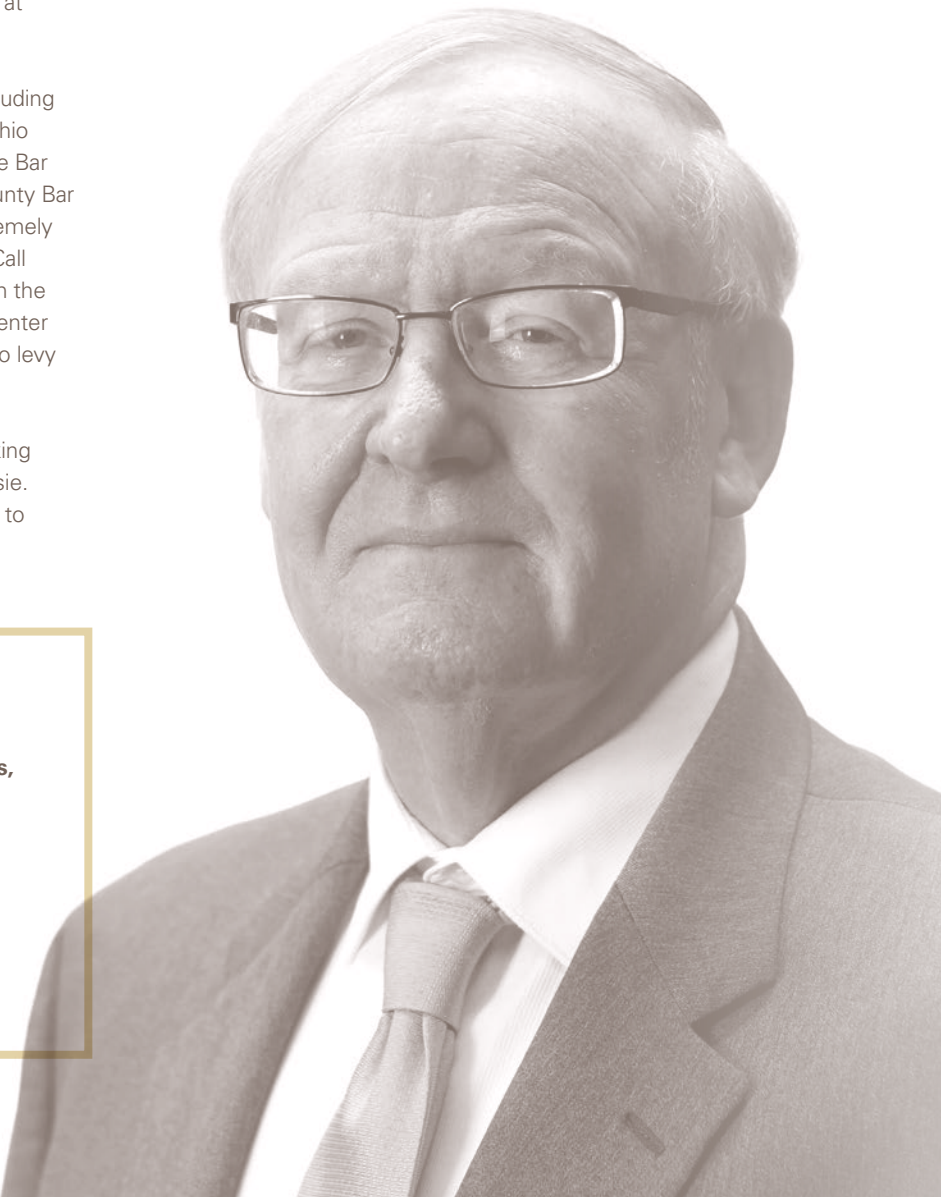
