Dear Friends,

The sun in our hometown certainly shines brighter and warms better thanks to generations of philanthropic leadership and charitable giving in our community. And, we're grateful to report that 2015 is no different! Some of this year's highlights are:

- New funds like the Grow Licking County Workforce Development Fund, Mike Johnson McDonald's Scholarship Fund, Louis A. Mitchell Fund, Utica Village Miller Park Fund, and YES for Solar! Fund afford opportunities for radiant futures through investments in manufacturing careers, higher education, annual travel, recreation and conservation.
- Grant projects like the Dawes Arboretum's The Fairchild Challenge environmental education outreach, the Licking County Family YMCA's All For One summer camp experience, and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's The Gardens on Sixth transitional housing complex provide shining possibilities for folks of all ages, abilities and walks of life.
- 435 scholarships like the Williams Memorial Scholarship (established in 1992 with a bequest from Helen Louise Williams) helped alleviate financial stresses for area students attending 99 different post-secondary educational institutions. (Helen Williams was valued by her family and friends for her kindness, courage and intelligence. The glow of her legacy has supported grateful students for more than two decades.)
- Educator support programs like Leaders for Learning Awards and Tibbie Leslie Travel Grants recognize, equip and encourage teachers with professional development, classroom supplies, curriculum materials, field trips, and even adventures abroad to exotic places such as Egypt, Peru and Sweden for expanding horizons and inspiring their students.
- Partnerships like the Licking County Nonprofit Enrichment Series capacity-building workshops with the United Way of Licking County and the Ohio Association of Nonprofit Organizations enabled 30 area nonprofits to grow and enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of their operations.
- Selfless gifts of treasure, time and expertise from our compassionate donors, dedicated volunteers and tenacious nonprofit partners contributed to the enduring vitality of our community in the spirit of Everett D. Reese and fellow founding visionaries of the Licking County Foundation.

On behalf of our entire Governing Committee and staff, we truly appreciate your continued commitment to our community. Thanks to your warm-hearted support, we're looking forward to a very bright future.

Year after year, the Foundation’s family of funds strengthen almost every aspect of life in our community. Each of our charitable funds is an inspiring reminder that our capacity to give is limited only by our imagination.

MICHAEL AND BARBARA CANTLIN FUND

A community charitable fund established by Michael and Barbara Cantlin for the purpose of pursuing their philanthropic goals and benefiting the charitable causes and organizations they care about most.

AUSTIN CAREINS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

A scholarship established by Troy and Chasity Hartman in memory of their son, Austin Michael Careins, who graduated from Licking Valley High School in 2011 with honors. He participated in cross country, track and, most importantly to him, wrestling. Austin was very proud to be part of the Licking Valley wrestling family. He was a four-year varsity letterman in wrestling and a District Qualifier. Austin attended the Florida Institute of Technology where he studied Astrophysics. The scholarship assists Licking Valley High School graduating seniors who demonstrate outstanding dedication on the Licking Valley Panthers Wrestling Team and want to further their studies at an accredited two-year or four-year college or university, trade school or technical school.

NANCY AND ROBERT DIX FUND

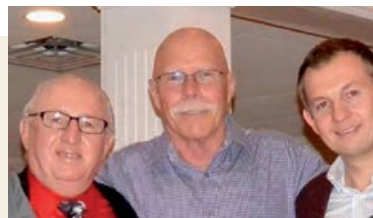
HANOVER-TOBOSO/LICKING VALLEY ALUMNI ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP FUND

A scholarship fund established by the Hanover-Toboso Alumni Association to assist Licking Valley High School graduating seniors who have attained a minimum GPA of 2.5 and want to further their studies at an accredited two-year or four-year college or university and trade school or technical school.



MIKE JOHNSON MCDONALD’S SCHOLARSHIP FUND

A scholarship fund established by Brian and Janine Mortellaro in memory of James Michael “Mike” Johnson, who was employed as the Physical Plant Supervisor at Mortellaro McDonald’s for more than 20 years and passed away on May 25, 2015. Mike was mechanically-inclined, and will be remembered for his special ability to repair anything. He was also generous, willing to share his vast knowledge of mechanical and electrical systems to help friends and family. Mike’s motto in life was “Always do the right thing because it’s the right thing to do.” This scholarship is also in honor of Mike’s wife, Jackie Johnson, and two daughters, Jackie Neighbarger and Sarah Johnson, who are all nurses. The scholarship assists residents of Guernsey, Holmes, Knox, Licking, Morrow and Muskingum counties who want to pursue degrees in the skilled trades, mechanical engineering and nursing at the Central Ohio Technical College. Recipients must also have participated in extracurricular activities, volunteer activities or work experience.

LOUIS A. MITCHELL FUND

A designated agency fund established through a bequest from the estate of Louis A. Mitchell in memory of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin C. Wright, to provide an annual spring trip to Washington DC for all 8th grade students in the City of Newark, Ohio school system, giving many students their first opportunity to travel beyond the area. Mr. Mitchell, who died in 2012, was one of Licking County’s most generous benefactors. He was a co-founder of Newark High School’s A Call

To College program and a major donor to Newark City School District, Denison University, the Licking County Family YMCA, and many others. He also founded the Licking County Settlers, a college-aged wooden-bat baseball team in 2006. Lou grew up in Newark, the son of a doctor, and gained local fame and the nickname “Earp” for his skills and accuracy on the basketball court for Newark High School and Denison University. Lou received two of the area’s highest philanthropic honors: the Everett D. Reese Award from the Licking County Foundation and the John Alford Community Service Award from the Licking County Chamber of Commerce. He was also inducted into the Ohio Basketball Hall of Fame in 2009. Lou began his career as a stockbroker and became chairman of the board of First Financial Group and its affiliate, Country Savings Bank in 1971. He was very active in the community, having served on the boards of the Central Ohio Lung Association, the Ohio Historical Society, the Columbus United Way’s Medical Division, Big Brothers Big Sisters Columbus, the Licking County Family YMCA and The Works.



UTICA VILLAGE MILLER PARK FUND

A project fund established by the Utica Parks and Recreation Improvement Committee for the purpose of raising funds to support the Miller Park renovation project in Utica, Ohio which includes the installation of playground equipment and a basketball court to provide a safe place for children to play and exercise.



WELSH HILLS SCHOOL ENDOWMENT FUND

An agency endowment fund established by the Board of Trustees of the Welsh Hills School for the purpose of providing scholarships. Celebrating its 37th year, the Welsh Hills School is an independent school serving children, infants through grade nine. Through its hands-on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) curriculum and project-based learning, students experience education in an environment that encourages creativity and nurtures a child’s natural love of learning.



YES FOR SOLAR! FUND

A project fund established by the Licking County Solar Cooperative and the Licking County Concerned Citizens for Public Health and the Environment for the purpose of raising funds for a solar installation on the roof of the YES Club building in downtown Newark, Ohio. The YES Club, a program of Mental Health America of Licking County, provides a safe haven and educational, wellness and developmental support for local youth ages 11 to 18 after school and during the summer. The goal of the YES for Solar! project is to offset as much of the electricity cost at the YES Club as possible through the installation of a solar array along with educational programs about solar energy, conservation, and the environment.

Capacity-Building Support For Nonprofits

THE LICKING COUNTY NONPROFIT ENRICHMENT SERIES

In a collaboration between LCF, the United Way of Licking County and the Ohio Association of Nonprofit Organizations (OANO), monthly capacity-building seminars were offered to enable Licking County nonprofits to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of their operations in order to realize and sustain their missions. The year-long program began with a two-day Standards for Excellence Clinic that provided participating organizations with best practices on how the most well-managed and responsibly-governed organizations should and do operate. Over the course of 2015, the series provided in-depth seminars covering board development, human resources, fundraising, marketing, outcome measurement, legal, leadership, and strategic planning. Generous support was provided by Licking Memorial Hospital (catering), and TrueCore Federal Credit Union (facility). Here's some positive feedback from some of the 30 participating organizations:



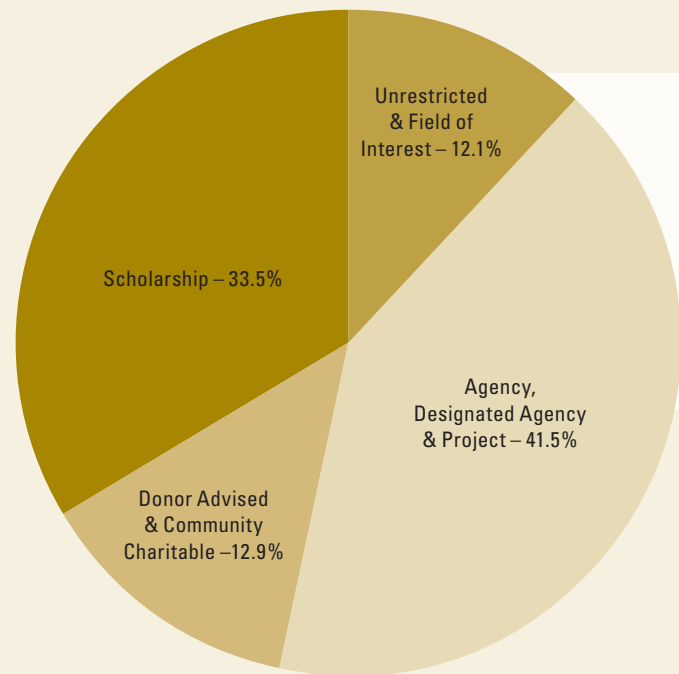

Grants TO THE COMMUNITY

The Foundation's grants help area nonprofits meet the ever-changing needs of our community: to respond to new programs, emerging needs, and innovative services. Our nonprofit grant partners make it possible for the Foundation to support a wide variety of activities benefiting local citizens of all ages (from infants to seniors) in the areas of arts and culture; education; health and human services; parks and recreation; the environment; economic development and more.

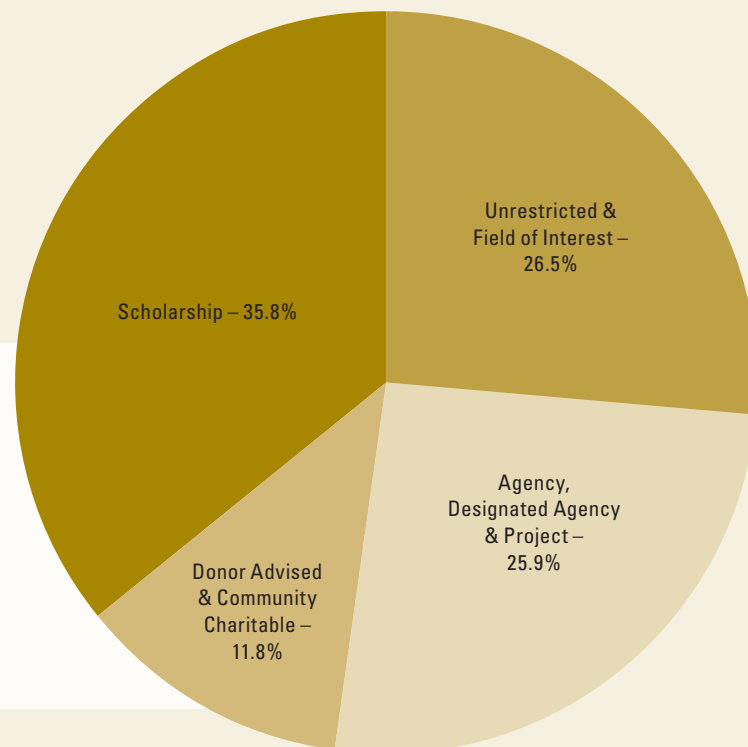

COMMUNITY GRANTS

Licking County's many capable and committed nonprofits contribute greatly to making this area such a tremendous place in which to live and work. Awarded annually through unrestricted and field of interest funds, these competitive grants help nonprofits meet the ever-changing needs of our community.

Each year, the Licking County Foundation accepts proposals from area nonprofit organizations as part of a competitive grantmaking process to respond to new programs, emerging needs, and innovative services that might not be started or continue were it not for the Foundation's support. \$346,047 in grants were awarded to 21 local nonprofit organizations through unrestricted and field of interest funds. These funds were established by compassionate donors to allow the Foundation flexibility in responding to the community's most pressing needs and taking advantage of the best opportunities. All grant recipients are organizations that serve Licking County residents.

In 2015, these grants supported a wide variety of activities benefiting citizens of all ages, with focus given to projects or programs that provide services for underserved youth and families, including preventive and emergency dental and vision care; advocacy for child victims of violence; positive mentorship and development programs for youth; and emergency assistance for basic needs. The Foundation awarded grants totaling \$113,190 (33%) to health; \$96,224 (28%) to human services; \$84,433 (24%) to education and mentoring youth; and \$52,200 (15%) to supportive, safe and livable communities. Summaries of recipient organization projects are as follows:

BIG BROTHERS BIG SISTERS OF LICKING & PERRY COUNTIES

\$18,098 to support expansion of the school-based mentoring program within Newark City Schools and Lakewood Local School District for sustaining existing matches as longer matches yield stronger, more positive youth outcomes.

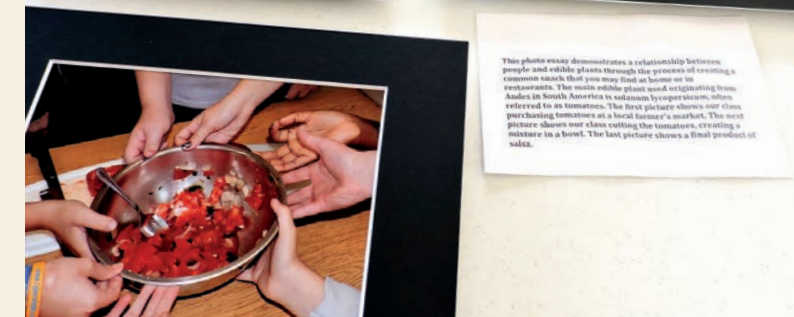


THE CENTER FOR BALANCED LIVING

\$11,224 to support the construction of a state-of-the-art Nutrition Center in a newly-purchased building (8001 Ravines Edge Court, Columbus) for specializing in evidence-based treatment, education and prevention, research, and fostering balance in the lives of all persons served in the area of eating disorders.

THE DAWES ARBORETUM

\$1,335 to support The Fairchild Challenge, a multidisciplinary, standards-based, environmental education outreach program designed to give students an opportunity to investigate the thorniest environmental issues, to devise imaginative and effective responses to these issues, and to take action to address them.

A classroom of students with multiple disabilities at Liberty Middle School in Newark created a photo essay to show the relationship between people and plants. They traveled to a market to buy vegetables and then prepared them into salsa. Their project won third place in the middle school competition!



FOOD PANTRY NETWORK OF LICKING COUNTY

\$35,000 to support the purchase and renovation of a new facility (1035 Brice Street, Newark), which provides increased capacity to secure and store food for people who face hunger every day, including space for an on-site produce market to provide fresh produce year-round.



HABITAT FOR HUMANITY MIDOHIO

\$10,000 to support the purchase of parcels of land in Newark for future development, the direct construction costs of one new home to be built in Newark, and a Rock the Block neighborhood impact event.

With each home build, several hundred community volunteers contribute between 2,500 to 3,500 volunteer hours.



JOHNSTOWN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH
\$10,000 to support the Johnstown-Northridge Freedom School, a six-week summer enrichment program which helps children fall in love with reading, increases their self-esteem, and generates more positive attitudes toward learning.

Young “scholars” participate in an energetic end-of-summer program to showcase their learning to family and friends.

LICKING COUNTY AGING PROGRAM
\$20,000 to support the Licking County Aging Program Emergency Utility Assistance Fund which provides emergency utility assistance to low-to-moderate income older adults (60 and over) when all other resources have been exhausted.

Licking County Aging Program improves the quality of life of Licking County senior citizens by contributing to their independence and healthy lifestyles. In addition to services provided to meet their clients daily needs, LCAP is home to 40 regularly scheduled clubs and offers dance lessons, card games, bingo and exercise classes.



LICKING COUNTY CENTER FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED
\$40,000 to support the Non-Senior Program, which provides full professional basic eye care health services, including glasses and low vision aids, to all qualified Licking County residents from birth to age 59.

LICKING COUNTY COMMUNITY HEALTH CLINIC
\$5,000 to purchase and stock medications that provide basic care and treatment of various ailments and infectious diseases for dispersing to uninsured and underinsured clients (18 to 65).

“Patients would routinely change pharmacies to redeem free discounts and promotions, or not have the means to get their needed prescriptions filled. Since having a stock on hand, it is very gratifying to supply their medications, rather than write them a prescription for a medication they can’t afford.”

LICKING COUNTY FAMILY YMCA
\$25,000 to support the All For One Camp which is designed to give children with varying abilities an opportunity to experience a traditional camp setting for developing a sense of community, building new relationships, and learning through first-hand experiences.

LICKING COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT
\$19,401 to support dental health education and prevent dental cavities in children by sealing the teeth of 2nd, 3rd, 6th and 7th graders in Licking County schools (Lakewood, Licking Valley, Newark City and North Fork school districts).

“There was a little girl whose baby teeth were all decayed. She was screened by our Dental Sealant team. The team was able to put dental sealants on her four new permanent six-year molars that had erupted behind those baby teeth. Her permanent teeth were then protected from cavities. The team also demonstrated a good tooth brushing technique to help her with future habits to keep her teeth and gums healthy. They referred her to a local dentist for fillings on her decayed baby teeth. They also offered financial assistance if her family needed assistance paying for dental care.”

LICKING MEMORIAL HOSPITAL
\$27,439 to support the Licking Memorial Dental Clinic for Children which provides access to preventative dental care to the uninsured children of Licking County’s low-income parents and educates the young patients on the importance of good dental hygiene as a way of life.

LICKING/KNOX GOODWILL INDUSTRIES, INC.
\$10,000 to support out-of-school activities throughout the school year and during the summer for youth (12 to 18) and their families participating in GoodGuides Youth Mentoring Program.

LOOK UP MINISTRIES
\$21,350 to support the operations of the Look Up Dental Clinic which provides free, urgent dental care services to uninsured, low-income adult residents of Licking County through a professional team consisting of mostly volunteers.

MENTAL HEALTH AMERICA OF LICKING COUNTY
\$15,000 to support the Girls In Progress program which utilizes school homeroom time to present topics including character building, mental health, financial literacy, healthy relationships and creativity to at-risk students at Heritage Middle School in Newark.

“Girls In Progress was one of the few reasons I was okay with coming to school. I knew that whatever personal things I had to say was between only us girls and I would never be judged. Having these other girls for support was a great feeling. Before the group, I would never have thought to talk to some of the other girls and now they are some of my best friends. Being sad was rarely an option in that group. They made sure you were always happy. Also my level of insecurities has gone down, because of the boost in confidence the whole group gives. Girls In Progress was a fantastic experience for me.”

MY PLACE TO BE
\$5,000 to support the STEP UP Camp MakeBelieve Program which works to prevent self-destructive behaviors and promote optimal mental health in teenagers who may need assistance in their developmental journey.

“We have one student this year who has a variety of challenges including the recent loss of his father in a car accident. He is eleven years old and struggled before this loss, but the loss intensified everything. It has been a long process, but in the last month when I ask him how he is, the answer has changed from 'grieving' to 'OK' and sometimes we even get a smile. He has felt comfortable in his group of friends to share his feelings and anxiety, and watching a weight being lifted and allowing him to be happy again will impact me for the rest of my life.”

NEWARK DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS
\$5,976 to support moving the Newark seal from its present location at the State Route 79 and State Route 16 overpass to a location in downtown Newark, as a component of the streetscapes plan to beautify the gateway into downtown Newark.



RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE CHARITIES OF CENTRAL OHIO
\$5,000 to support the Helping Hands program which is designed to help support nights of rest for families of seriously-ill children from Licking County.

“When I found out I was pregnant everything seemed normal until the 37-week ultrasound. I was rushed to surgery for an emergency C-section. As my daughter entered the world, there were complications from the beginning. She was diagnosed with Trisomy 18. For the next several weeks I stayed with my family and four children at the Ronald McDonald House. At the House we had a place to sleep, eat and shower, but most importantly be together as a family. With the House being across the street, we were able to be by her bedside when she needed us the most. I don’t know what we would have done without it.”

LEADERS FOR LEARNING GRANTS

Leaders for Learning Award recipients can apply for grants up to \$500 to further their professional development or purchase materials for their classrooms. The awards and 35 grants totaling over \$16,000 were made possible through generous support by the Lindorf-Warner Memorial Fund of the Licking County Foundation.

Lori Fender, a 2014 Leader for Learning Award Recipient and second grade teacher at Granville Elementary School received a Leaders for Learning grant to purchase books for her classroom. These books, utilized during guided reading groups and for students to read during their independent reading time, included a variety of sets and single copies of books on the second reading grade or higher. Mrs. Fender's class delighted us by sharing thoughtful notes and their favorite new books.



Scholarship PROGRAM

Our donors believe in the power of higher education and that the future of our area depends upon a well-educated and experienced workforce—almost 40% of the Foundation’s assets support scholarships. LCF awarded scholarships totaling \$910,783 to 435 area high school seniors, college students and adult re-entry students who attended 99 different colleges, universities or trade schools across the country. The scholarship awards ranged from \$500 to \$7,000, and many of this year’s awardees received LCF scholarships in previous years—some multiple times. Scholarship recipients were selected from a pool of 740 applicants by the Foundation’s volunteer Scholarship Review Committee. August 25, 1915 The Home Building Association Company opens its new office at 1 North Third Street.

1984–2007 Tiffany's Ice Cream Parlor occupies the building.

2013 Building donated to the Licking County Foundation by Stephen Jones and preservation planning begins.

Giving New Life to “The Old Home”

Early 2014 “Team Sullivan,” a taskforce of local leaders, is formed to provide strategic guidance.

November 11, 2014 An open house reintroduces the Sullivan Building to the region and potential program partners and donors.



April 25, 2015 Young Ohio Preservationists, a volunteer affiliate of Heritage Ohio, toured the Sullivan Building and designed a charrette around its reuse.

May 2, 2015 The Granville Studio of Visual Art's adult art students exhibited their work at the Sullivan Building as part of Newark FAMFEST.

June 5, 2015 The Ohio State University's Knowlton School of Architecture's Camp Architecture high school participants spent the day at the Sullivan Building, and also designed a charrette around its reuse.

August 22, 2015 The centennial observance of Louis Sullivan's Newark jewel box bank was celebrated with programs at the Licking County Library and bank tours.



Planning a New Home for Explore Licking County



June–October 2016 Basement rehabilitation will be completed.

November 2016 A master plan and an estimate will be in place for completing the restoration of the Sullivan Building.

2017 A capital campaign will be launched to raise funds for transforming the building as the new home of Explore Licking County.

2018 Restoration will be completed and planning for the grand reopening celebration begins.
